



After having fun, soothe your fatigue in a hot spring.

We recommend hot springs for those who want to spend more time relaxing. Monbetsu Onsen Tonekko no Yu, a free-flowing natural hot spring, is a favorite of the locals. It is also close to the ocean and the Hidaka Tomikawa Interchange, making it the perfect place to relax after a long day of driving. Sarugawa Onsen is located near the Sarugawa Campground and Ski

Resort, so you can rinse the sweat off your body after a day of fun.

The variety of Biratori, from tomatoes to wagyu



The town of Biratori is the largest shipper of tomatoes in Hokkaido. Heat and humidity are not good for tomatoes, so the cool climate created by the Hidaka Mountains and the Saru River is ideal for their cultivation. The brand name tomatoes Nispa's lover are popular not only for fresh consumption but also for processed products such as tomato juice, puree, and ketchup.








One more thing we must mention is Biratori Wagyu. The cattle, which have withstood the freezing winter cold, make for beef featuring a dense flavor that is packed with meatiness.

It takes up to 40 months to raise a single cattle. The great taste of Wagyu beef comes from love and care it receives. You can watch the cows grazing at the ranch operated by the town of Biratori.

Nibutani Kotan in Biratori is home to a number of Ainu culture-related facilities, including the Nibutani Ainu Culture Museum, the Historical Museum of the Saru River, and the Ainu Culture Information Center. In the *kotan*, which means *village* in Ainu, visitors can learn about and experience the traditions and culture of the Ainu people through the display of folk tools and crafts that were actually used as well as the reproduction of traditional houses called *chise*.






Enjoy history while enjoying a soothing view of beautiful flowers.

The largest cluster of wild lily-of-the-valley in Japan is the Memu Lily-of-the-Valley Field. The best time to see them is from late May to mid-June, when you can enjoy the lovely lily-of-the-valley typical of Hokkaido. Yoshitsune Shrine is great for history buffs. One of the legends of Yoshitsune that still persists in various parts of the country is also found in Biratori, and the statue of Yoshitsune, which was donated by an official of the Edo Shogunate during the Edo period, is still enshrined here.

Niikappu, amazing to see and enchanting to listen to



The world's largest oil painting is on display at the Di-Maccio Art Museum, The Forest of Taiyo, which was constructed from an abandoned former elementary school. Mirrors are placed on the top, bottom, left and right sides of the painting, making you feel as if you are lost in an endless universe. The world that embodies Di-Maccio's imagination is overwhelming to the visitors.








The Re-cord Museum is a popular tourist spot that many people think of when they think of Niikappu. The museum has a collection of over one million analog records, and you can actually listen to them. The town's landmark observatory, Yushun Tower offers a panoramic view of the town, and together with the adjacent Michi no Eki (roadside station), Thoroughbred Road Niikappu, is a great place to stay for sightseeing.

The steep cliffs of Cape Hangan can be seen from the observation deck of the Re-cord Museum. It faces the Pacific Ocean, and the sunset that can be seen along with the cape is truly spectacular. There is a campground adjacent to the cape, so we also recommend

barbecuing while admiring the sunset. You can see Cape Hangan from the open-air bath at the Niikappu Onsen Re-cord no Yu. This is the perfect place to relax after a day of enjoying horseback riding or mountain climbing, to help heal your tired body from the inside out.





Thoroughbred Ginza, a series of horse farms, is a treasured place for horse lovers.

Along Hokkaido Route 209, there is an approximately 8km stretch of thoroughbred ranches called Thoroughbred Ginza. The Thoroughbred Ginza Parking Lot Park, located at the entrance, is a spot where you can enjoy watching future racehorses run freely. The Yushun Memorial Hall, a museum dedicated to the achievements of the famous horse Oguri Cap, is also located along the way, making it a treasured destination for horse lovers.
